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# **Back in the Classroom**


When 24-year-old Kira Stone and her fiancé, Brandon Benenati, welcomed in the New Year in January 2017, they had an exciting year ahead. In the planning stages since 2015, their wedding was scheduled for the summer and both were looking forward to the "big day" and the start of a happy life together.

Just eleven days later, their world turned upside down. On Kira's way in to work as a kindergarten teacher in Dolgeville, NY, an oncoming car crossed the middle line and hit her car head on. She was airlifted to Albany Medical Center where she spent the next three weeks. two in the ICU.

"I have no recollection of the accident or my time at the medical center," said Kira, who would not regain consciousness for several weeks.

Her injuries were devastating. In addition to a traumatic brain injury, Kira suffered 16 broken

bones, internal bleeding, and damage to many organs, including her lung, liver and spleen.

On February 2, Kira was transferred to Sunnyview Rehabilitation Hospital's Neuro-Rehab Institute and admitted to the Traumatic Brain Injury program.

"Sunnyview's Traumatic Brain Injury Center of Excellence provides a comprehensive continuum of care, including a Coma Recovery Program, Inpatient Acute Rehabilitation Program, Outpatient Neurological Center, Driving Center and Sports Concussion Program," noted Paul Novak, MS, OTR, director.

Kenneth Shapiro, MD, was Kira's physiatrist at Sunnyview. He noted that upon admission, Kira was considered low-level in her responsiveness – in other words, she was not responding appropriately to her surroundings. It was important to let her brain recover, but also to re-establish the pathways for normal functioning.

"Like all patients at Sunnyview, Kira had three hours of therapy each day," stated Dr. Shapiro. "Through physical and visual stimulation, and with repetition that is fundamental to therapy, we helped

retrain Kira's healing brain for normal and efficient patterns of behavior."

Kira remembers the early days at Sunnyview and the fact that she was tired all the time. "All I wanted to do was sleep," she recalled. "But my therapists wouldn't have it!" She persevered, participating in intense physical therapy to get her walking again, occupational therapy to help with her hand movement and fine motor skills, and speech/language therapy to work on her cognitive skills. "It was frustrating and, at times, painful, but the best thing for me was

therapy," she now admits.

Kira especially enjoyed aquatic therapy in Sunnyview's Golub Therapy Pool. "The pool was fun and warm ... and was something different to do!" she said. In addition to the pool, Kira found the pet therapy program to be a bright spot in her stay. Volunteer handlers, many from the Schenectady Chapter of Therapy Dogs International (TDI), bring certified therapy dogs to visit with patients in the therapy gym.

"There is an emotional benefit to having the dogs visit, and even more importantly, the program serves as an opportunity for patients to get out of their rooms and socialize with other

patients," noted Jennifer Battle, CTRS, lead recreation therapist.

On April, 3, nearly three months after the accident, Kira returned home. "It was my mother's birthday, so my coming home was a great birthday present!" she said. Four months later on August 5, at the Rosamond Gifford Zoo in Syracuse, Kira and Brandon stood before 175 family and friends and were married.

Kira returned to her kindergarten class in September. "A full-time physical aide was hired to assist me with walking the class to special activities, helping me walk outside during fire drills and other things for which I needed help."


Earlier this year, on May 6, Kira received a master's degree from Utica College. She continues outpatient therapy twice weekly in Little Falls, NY.

"There are still things I can't do, like sitting on the floor with my students, and I'm limited with the physical activities that I used to enjoy, like running, hiking and karate," she added. "I am slowly making progress at becoming more and more physically independent to the greatest extent my body is capable of. I'm grateful to Brandon, who has been my rock, to my family ... and to so many people for helping me get to where I am today!"

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# **Individualized Outpatient Rehabilitation**

In August 2017, Albert Bowdish underwent a fifth back surgery for spinal stenosis, a medical condition in which the spinal canal narrows, compressing the spinal cord and nerves. After his surgery, Albert, and his wife, Edith, were told he may never walk again. Albert came to Sunnyview with the goal of being able to simply transfer from his bed to his wheelchair. After just 2 1/2 weeks of intensive inpatient rehabilitation with therapist Barbara Scheidel, Albert began seeing marked improvements.

After his inpatient stay, Albert continued his therapy as an outpatient at Sunnyview Therapy Services at Socha Plaza in Glenville with Matt Frear, DPT. He had outpatient therapy with Matt after his previous surgeries, and appreciated the familiarity and continuity of his care. The individualized therapy services Albert received helped him regain his ability to walk, using only a cane for support.

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# **Sunnyview's Ventilator Weaning Program**

# Helping Patients Breathe Again

Mechanical ventilation is a lifesustaining intervention for individuals
unable to breathe on their own due
to a serious illness or injury such as
respiratory failure, traumatic brain
injury, stroke, spinal cord injury, or
other medical condition. In some
instances, a ventilator can assist the
patient in breathing normally, and in
other cases, it may perform the task
completely so that the patient can rest
and recover. While a ventilator does
not cure an illness, it sustains life until
the patient is able to breathe on his
or her own.

Usually a patient is on a ventilator for only a short period of time, however, there are times when one is needed for weeks or months. In such cases, it may be necessary for the patient to be weaned off the ventilator gradually. Sunnyview Rehabilitation Hospital is proud to offer a highly successful ventilator weaning program, one of only a few programs in the country that provides vent weaning, medical management and intensive therapy in the acute hospital setting. The skilled team is trained in the most recent techniques and research. Led by critical care physicians, nurse practitioners and a physiatrist, the team includes certified rehabilitation nurses (CCRNs); respiratory, physical, occupational and speech therapists; neuropsychologists; social workers; care managers; recreational therapists; and dietitians.

"In 2017, 73 patients were admitted to Sunnyview's ventilator weaning program with an average length of stay of 27 days," stated Nancy Smith, RN, program manager. "This compares very favorably with other inpatient programs in the nation and region. What's more, 82 percent of patients were able to come off the ventilator."

One of them was Ronald Walczak of Bennington, VT.

In September, 2017, Ron was recuperating from chest surgery for fractured ribs after a fall when he suddenly began feeling weak and was having difficulty breathing. Rushed to Samaritan Hospital in Troy, he was soon diagnosed with Guillain-Barré syndrome (GBS), a rare neurological disorder in which the body's immune system mistakenly attacks part of its peripheral nervous system — the network of nerves located outside of the brain and spinal cord.

While GBS can range from a very mild case with brief weakness, it can also

lead to nearly devastating paralysis, leaving the person unable to breathe independently.

This, unfortunately, was the case with Ron. In early October, he was transferred to Sunnyview completely paralyzed, with a ventilator and feeding tube keeping him alive. He was unable to move or communicate.

Ron spent almost two months at Sunnyview, working with the entire team of rehabilitation specialists and slowly regaining his mobility and function. Most importantly, with the help of the interdisciplinary team, he was gradually weaned off the ventilator.

Ron especially remembers working with Petros Pravasilis, MS, CCC-SLP, the speech/language pathologist who played an important role in the weaning process by helping Ron communicate and learn how to swallow again.

# Research Projects at Sunnyview



In order to advance the state of the science and provide patients with the highest quality evidence-based care, Sunnyview Rehabilitation Hospital remains committed to original research aimed at developing innovative treatments across a broad range of disciplines.

At Sunnyview, research is a fundamental part of the hospital's culture. Its clinical ladder program, designed to reward individual therapists who have displayed extraordinary efforts beyond their daily routine, requires participation in nationally recognized clinical research studies as a prerequisite for consideration. Additionally, new staff members are encouraged to participate in research projects under the direction of senior principal investigators.

## Research projects recently completed include:

- Improving Patient Safety Michele Cournan, DNP, RN, CRRN, Benjamin Fusco-Gessick, MA, and Laura Wright, RN, CRRN. A 2016 study published in the Journal of Rehabilitation Nursing showed how Sunnyview's use of a video monitoring system improved patient safety by decreasing falls.
- **Pediatric Brain Injury** Vincent Somaio, MD and Benjamin Fusco-Gessick, MA. A 2018 study presented at the North American Brain Injury Society

Conference examined how the level of consciousness at admission predicted differences in community discharge rates.

· Rehabilitation and the Elderly Paul Novak, MS, OTR, Nancy Smith, RN, and Benjamin Fusco-Gessick, MA. A 2016 study presented at the American Medical Rehabilitation Providers Association conference and American Association of Cardiovascular and Pulmonary Rehabilitation showed that age is not a predictor of a patient's ability to benefit from acute rehabilitation and that a small number of discrete functional abilities predicted discharge destination.

 Coordinated Hearing Care Margaret Halinski, MM, AuD. A 2017 case study presented at the American Academy of Audiology Conference showed how coordinated care between audiology and ear, nose and throat physicians resulted in the resolution of mixed hearing loss.

## **Ongoing research at Sunnyview** includes studies examining:

- · The impact of medical literacy on medication management (Gillen, Fusco-Gessick)
- The use of an augmentative communication system for patients with tracheostomies (Castellina, Pravasilis, Labarge)
- Methods of assessing and treating unilateral spatial neglect in stroke patients (Gillen, Fusco-Gessick)
- · The effectiveness of body-weightsupported treadmill training for TBI patients (McCarroll, Valenza, Provost, Maloney, Lenge)

# Lower Your Taxes with the New Tax Law

#### Make an outright gift of an appreciated asset to charity

This strategy allows you to support Sunnyview while generating a charitable tax deduction and potentially capital gains tax savings. This strategy provides tax benefits to itemizers and non-itemizers.

#### Give from your pre-tax assets by making an IRA rollover gift

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# **Sunnyview's Ventilator Weaning Program**

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"We performed a videofluoroscopic swallowing study to assess his swallow function and determine an appropriate course of treatment to help Ron get back to eating and drinking. As part of our therapy we also utilized a number of techniques and devices, including the Passy-Muir speaking valve which attaches to the outside opening of the tracheostomy tube to restore Ron's speech and improve his ability to communicate."

Ron and his wife also credit the very supportive rehabilitation nurses and nurse practitioners for their care and compassion throughout a very difficult process.

"Everyone at Sunnyview was so professional, helping me deal with the tremendous anxiety I was feeling as I practiced swallowing and breathing on my own." noted Ron. "When they finally took the trach tube out, it was so great to be able to talk and hear my own voice again!"
